Chairman's Message

This summer has seen a number of occupations, by Travellers, of Parish Land. The Parish has been fortunate that with the co-operation of local Thames Valley Police (TVP) and RBWM officers, we were able to move the Travellers on in relatively short time.

Such trespassing is a civil offence and private landowners cannot rely on police action and must go down the route of employing bailiffs or alternatively taking court action. Bailiffs can be expensive and confrontational and court action often takes time (typically a week)

Where the occupied land is a "community asset" and the occupation is six or more vehicles, police have the option to use their, so called, Section 61 powers and move on the vehicles after notice to leave has been issued, in person, by the landowner.

Our Clerk has done a lot of work on this subject with both RBWM and TVP and can advise on the way forward if any of our residents are troubled by such incursions in the future. Please see her report on page 6.

The Bray Parish Neighbourhood Plan (BPNP), completed and submitted in November 2016, continues to move very slowly through the inspection and referendum process and it will be up to the Main Council Meeting in October to decide whether or not to accept the much modified document as received back from the inspection process.

The whole neighbourhood plan initiative was spun out of David Cameron's Localism legislation and was conceived as a "bottom up" process with local people shaping the future of their local area.

After five years work by the BPNP Steering Group, which incidentally included two of our Borough Ward Councillors, the plan has been considerably modified and "watered down" by the Inspector and RBWM planners.

As the plan was based on a number of well attended workshops and Parish wide surveys, it is disappointing to end up with a 'plan' that no longer reflects the priorities or wishes of the residents.

The Future for Bray Parish?

You will have all seen that the Smart Motorway work has started on the M4. This seven year project to turn the motorway between Heathrow and Junction 12 into a computer controlled "smart highway" has prompted Bray Parish Council (BPC) to form a Traffic and Infrastructure Working Group to consider the likely effects on the Parish of new developments either already approved or planned for the area.

Over the past few years, BPC has identified a number of areas where traffic problems are causing concern and inconvenience to local residents and the Parish Council has voiced these concerns to RBWM. New developments proposed for the area have the potential to make matters worse if there is not major improvement to traffic flows and infrastructure.

The Borough Local Plan (BLP), currently under inspection, includes a number of developments in Bray Parish

- **HA 11 – Land north and south of the A308 west of Windsor – 650 dwellings**
- **HA 23 - Monkey Island Lane – 100 dwellings**
- **HA 18 - Land south of Bray Lake - 100 dwellings and a Hospice.**
- **HA 17 - Tectonic Place – 25 dwellings.**

The BLP states that the buildings will fit in with the local character and so will, almost certainly, be three and four bedroom houses each having 2 or 3 cars.

The BLP proposed housing development in the Parish alone would add 2000 vehicles to the area.

In addition to the BLP we have seen the following schemes given planning approval by RBWM.

- **The re-location of the Phoenix Gym from Water Oakley to Fifield.**
- **The construction of the Hospice at Bray Lake.**
The scheme that has been approved is considerably more than a 28-bed hospice and it is in fact a headquarters building for a large organisation. There are parking spaces for 200 vehicles and the organisation itself has stated that there will be 500+ vehicle movements per day spread across a 12-hour period. It is difficult to see how this could have been approved in advance of the inspection and adoption of the BLP. The hospice will be located adjacent to a known pollution "hot spot". The Air Quality Management Area (AQMA) associated with the M4 Bridge over the A308 already has pollution levels above the current accepted safe limits.
- **Additional accommodation at LEGOLAND.**
RBWM has given approval for considerable expansion of accommodation on a Greenbelt site on the edge of Bray Parish. This permission was granted by RBWM against the specific recommendation of their own planning officers.

With the exception of the 25 houses planned for Tectonic Place, all the above building will be on Bray Parish Greenbelt land. In addition to the above plans have been submitted for the following:-

- **Water Oakley**
Application has been made to increase the number of dwellings on this greenbelt site from the 44 (already approved) large houses to 127 smaller dwellings.
- **Fifield**
A scheme to apply to build a significant number of houses on a field in Fifield Village is under consideration.
- **Lodge Farm Holyport**
Outline plans have been submitted to RBWM to build 150 houses on this field between Holyport Road and the A330 Ascot Road.

In addition to the potential development listed above in Bray Parish, there are other schemes planned for the area, which will have further impact on the Parish and its infrastructure.

- **150 Bed Hotel at Windsor Racecourse**
- **Maidenhead Golf Club**
The BLP makes provision for 2000 dwellings to be built on Maidenhead Golf Course. If the Golf Club relocates, as planned, to the Biffa land between Springfield Park and the Fifield Road, this will further add to traffic in the Parish.

It has been estimated that over the two-year construction period that it will take 50,000 tipper truck movements to deliver the topsoil required to landscape the site.

When in operation, it is anticipated that the golf club will result in approximately 850 vehicle movements per day.

The Parish Council is deeply concerned by the situation detailed above on two counts.

- **The loss of Parish Greenbelt land.**
With the exception of Tectonic Place, all proposed development listed is on Parish Greenbelt. We know from the work undertaken over the past seven years by the Bray Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group that our residents cherish and wish to keep the "Green Gaps" between the existing built up areas in the Parish.
- **The resulting extra traffic, congestion and pollution** caused by the additional vehicles in the Parish.

No doubt there will be additional traffic generated by other not so local developments such as Crossrail and the large-scale building in other adjacent boroughs.

It must be recognised that the existing Bray Parish infrastructure will not cope if this development goes ahead. It is barely coping now.

In response to prompting by BPC and other resident's organisations the Royal Borough applied for, and received, funding from Central Government to conduct a study into the traffic flows on the A308. This money was made available some four or five months ago but RBWM have yet to place a contract for this study to be undertaken.

If nothing is done to improve the infrastructure, the Parish will grind to a halt in the very near future.

Are you recycling as much as you can?

Almost half of the rubbish we collect each week is recycling. However we could do more as 80 per cent of all our rubbish is recyclable. So are you recycling as much as you can?

What can we put into our recycling bins? *These (and only these!) go loose into your recycling bin*

- ✓ Rinsed-out glass bottles and jars - did you know that glass used in packaging can be infinitely recycled with no loss of quality?
- ✓ Washed plastic tubs, pots, trays and bottles of all colours, including black. Our humble plastic packaging could soon enjoy a second life as fleece clothing, garden furniture or carpet.
- ✓ Empty and rinsed metal drinks cans and food tins - the aluminium recycled from a tin can be back doing its duty on the supermarket shelves in as little as four weeks.
- ✓ Practically all paper and card – clean, non-coated paper and card is gratefully accepted; however greasy cardboard, such as pizza box bases, and glittery or plastic coated card are definite no-nos.

Banish these from your blue recycling bin...

- ✗ **Plastic bags – please don't use plastic carriers to sort your recycling in the blue bin – just jumble all your recycling in loose and we sort it later! Many large supermarkets have plastic bag recycling points, so reuse and recycle where you can.**
- ✗ **Nappies – surprisingly these are one of the most common items that end up in the recycling. Yuck!**
- ✗ **Bubble wrap** and plastic film
- ✗ Foil coated in plastic, such as crisp packets, sweet wrappers and gift wrap
- ✗ Card with glitter or shiny coatings
- ✗ Toughened glass, such as Pyrex cookware and drinking glasses – these have a different melting point to the standard glass used in packaging
- ✗ Polystyrene
- ✗ Dirty and stained paper and card
- ✗ Foil coated lids, such as yoghurt tops
- ✗ Foil lined food pouches, such as pet food, baby food and coffee pouches
- ✗ Food waste, garden waste and textiles – yes, these can be recycled, but no, not in your blue recycling bin.

These items are collected separately...

- ✓ Clean clothing and textiles – if you have items that wouldn't pass muster at the charity shop, place them in a single plastic bag, tie the top, label or write on the bag 'textiles' and leave this next to your bins on collection day. Your recycling crew will leave you a [lovely pink bag](#) for your next batch of clothing and textile recycling.
- ✓ Any food waste - mouldy recycling bin, anyone? Didn't think so! Not a pretty sight or smell when scraps of food end up loose in the recycling bin. Why not order your [FREE outdoor food waste bin](#) and start your [food recycling adventures](#) today?
- ✓ Green waste from the garden – keep cuttings and other green waste out of both your blue recycling bin and your black rubbish bin. For just £36 a year, you can subscribe to RBWM's [fortnightly green waste collection](#).

From the Holyport Community Trust - Bringing Holyport Together

Holyport Pond

You will recall that the Parish Council did a considerable amount of work to Holyport Pond a few years ago removing leaf debris. The very hot weather this year caused the level of the water in Holyport Pond to fall to dangerously low levels. Following contact from the Environment Agency, the Clerk met with Stuart Keable of the Fisheries Department who confirmed that there were fish in the pond and that the water levels needed to be drastically increased to enable the fish to survive. Local residents have also seen evidence of Terrapins in the pond and in response to the Clerk's queries Stuart advised that they were unlikely to become big enough to cause any problems for the wildlife. Stuart was extremely complimentary about the way the pond is maintained, mentioning that the reeds and grasses provide a good habitat for small fish and other pond wildlife.

Mr Keable was also able to assist the Clerk in her efforts to get the pond topped up by liaising with the environment department of South East Water.

Footpaths in Bray Parish

Bray Parish has an extensive network of footpaths available to walkers and ramblers. Some cover a comparatively short stretch (for example, The Causeway from Bray Green to Hibbert Road) and others can be linked to construct a circular trail of almost two miles. One of these, focussing on Holyport Ward, is detailed and illustrated in a leaflet available from the Parish Office.



Footpaths are numbered and in Oakley Green for example, numbers 52, 54 and 55 criss-cross agricultural land and elsewhere, number 2, 3 and 5 provide intersecting routes across what was a (Biffa) landfill site. Ramblers, dog walkers and bird watchers enjoy using footpaths and there are bridleways too for horse riders.

All these facilities are assets for the public but require care, maintenance and notification by sign posting. RBWM publishes on its website Definitive Maps of Public Rights of Way. The majority of Bray Parish is noted on sheet 10 but Oakley Green features on sheet 11 and Paley Street, for example, on page 9. Maps can be found at the following;

Travellers – Unlawful Incursions, What to Do, Who to contact

This year the Parish Council has experienced an unprecedented number of unauthorised encampments by travellers. The responsibility for dealing with an unauthorised encampment rests with the landowner. So to ensure that the Parish Council is able to deal with unlawful incursions onto Parish Council Land as effectively as possible, the Clerk has had a number of conversations with the local police and officers at RBWM to develop a set of protocols to use when dealing with unlawful incursions.

The Parish Council when dealing with unauthorised encampments on Parish land is considered a Private Land Owner and has the same rights in law and has to follow the same rules as private landowners when faced with the same situation. It should be borne in mind that trespass is not a criminal offence but a civil one. So how has the Parish Council learnt to deal with unauthorised encampments?

Start a Timeline include all the following steps with dates and times each take place.

Contact the police on 101, advising the number of vehicles, exact location and requesting a URN number.

Request Section 61 Notice; the Clerk asks the police to invoke Section 61 of the Criminal Justice and Public Order Act 1994 if aware of damage to property, experience of threatening behaviour or there are 6 or more vehicles.

Issue an Eviction Notice; ask Police Officers to accompany the Clerk as 'landowner' and a Ward Councillor to the site so that eviction notices can be issued to each vehicle, which require travellers to leave by 4:00pm on the day of notice and advising that the Council will apply to Slough County Court for a repossession order if the notice is not complied with by that time.

Provide a map that highlights the whole of the area referred to on the eviction notices.

Do not engage with the travellers; allow the police to respond to any questions or conversations.

Photograph a copy of the eviction notice pinned at the entrance to the area so that any additional travellers accessing the area after the initial eviction do not need to be separately served and providing proof that notice has been served.

Evidence of any damage is compiled to provide background information for either a possible Section 61 eviction by the Police or as evidence during the Court process.

Registration numbers of vehicles are noted so that in the event of any further incursions, information can be provided to the police as proof that travellers are in breach of either a Court Repossession Order or Section 61 notice issued within the previous 90 days.

A Code of Conduct should be issued to the travellers by the Police, which advise of the behaviours that may result in the police evicting travellers from the site using Section 61 Powers. These include; camping upon land designated as a public amenity; interfering with the rights and freedoms of other members of the public, including interrupting the operation of legitimate businesses; forcing entry to land; causing any damage to the land itself or property on it; driving vehicles along any footpath or highway not specifically designed for road vehicles; parking vehicles or caravans on any road, footpath or other highway that causes an obstruction to other people wanting to pass by; dumping or tipping rubbish, waste materials or trade waste such as tree cuttings, rubble etc. use of the area as a toilet; abuse, intimidation or harassment of any person who is lawfully using the area; excessive noise or other forms of anti-social behaviour; animals that are not kept under control or that attack persons lawfully on the land, or nearby and interference with electrical, water or gas supplies.

Any breaches of the Code of Conduct or criminal activities that are experienced during the eviction period are reported to the police using the same URN number so the police are able to build up a profile that may enable them to invoke a Section 61 Order. The Clerk also advises RBWM of the incursion so that they can liaise with Police and be able to answer queries from residents.

To date the Police have invoked Section 61 in the majority of cases so the Parish Council has not had to continue with Court Action.

Prepare to go to Court to obtain a possession order under Part 55 of the Civil Procedures Rules by using the online application form at Slough County Court, which has jurisdiction for the area. A possession order is usually secured within a week.

Attend Court with Solicitor, to advise where the encampment is situated, how many caravans and how many motor vehicles, chronological timeline of events, photographic evidence of security prior to incursion and details of damage caused. There is no requirement to provide any reason for the eviction other than it is private land. The Order will be written at this time, which is why attendance at court is required.

Serve the Order as soon as possible asking the police to accompany and advise both travellers and police that Bailiffs will be employed to evict if the order is not complied with within 24 hours.

Thames Valley Police advise that Landowners should review the security of their land and take measures to prevent against unlawful incursions by travellers.

The Parish Council would like to thank all those residents who have reported incursions and who have given their time to clear up the dreadful mess that has been left following each incursion.

Looking after our Assets

Looking after the assets of the Parish Council has been a challenge this summer due to the unprecedented number of incursions by travellers onto Parish Land as mentioned previously in the newsletter. Difficult decisions have had to be made not only by the Parish Council, but also by local residents in Holyport who have supported the Parish Council decision to put in place a number of security measures to reduce the possibility of future incursions on Holyport Green.

It was initially hoped to leave the area of the Green in front of Pebbles Court open, but a number of residents asked for security measures to be taken there as well and the Parish Council is supporting this request. Holyport Green as residents will know is an extensive area, covering not just the area at the junctions on Moneyrow Green, Holyport Road, Holyport Street and the Ascot Road, but also both sides of the A330 Ascot Road to Bartlett's Lane. Serious consideration has been given by the Land Management Working Group to the type of measures that can be taken and Councillors are determined these will be as unobtrusive as possible, will be reversible if, in the future a transit site is made available within the Borough, and as far as possible in keeping with the Greenbelt and Conservation Area designations. The measures are expected to include ditches with a bund, the resetting of the stones on the area outside Holyport Lodge and a mixture of bollards both static and rising. As Holyport Green is in the Conservation Area, the Clerk has been liaising with Conservation Officers to ensure that the measures to be taken are suitable for the area and planning permission will be applied for.

Bray Green has had four rising bollards installed, two at the entrance to Bray Green and two at the entrance to Jubilee Field (we are indebted to James Noakes for his help with the project). The ditch along the Bray Road has also been extended and plans to install additional bollards along the Causeway Car Park are under way.

A height restrictor gate is to be ordered for the entrance to Gays Lane. We hope the existing gate will be retained so that those with permission to take their cars onto the field may continue to do so.

We are of course aware that if the travellers are determined to access land they will do so. We can only do our best to make the area as difficult for them to access as possible.
