



CHAIRMAN'S MESSAGE

For the last year the Parish Council has been working with local residents to restrict HGVs from using Oakley Green Road. I am pleased to report that the 7.5 tonne restriction has been implemented and local haulage contractors have been informed. The required signs have been ordered by RBWM and will hopefully be installed by the time this newsletter is circulated. The ban is not total, as deliveries to sites inside the prohibited area will still be permitted.

In the last edition of this newsletter I reported that, following the May 2019 elections, we had three Holyport Ward vacancies on this parish council. The co-option process undertaken in the autumn last year has resulted in two new (or nearly new) councillors. Mike Singh and Chris Langdridge have joined the council. Mike and Chris have both served on Bray Parish Council in the past and we welcome their return.

In the past six months your Parish Council has commented on a number of consultations regarding large potential developments in the vicinity of the parish.

The Lodge Farm Development Appeal. Your Parish Council took professional advice for the Lodge Farm appeal and the appeal was rejected. The applicant asked for a Judicial Review of the decision, which was rejected by the High Court. We know from work done by the Bray Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group that our residents cherish and wish to retain the green gaps between settlements in the parish.

The Waste and Gravel Consultation centred on an application to have the land between Bray Parish allotments and Old Mill Lane entered into the Mineral Plan for future gravel extraction. This Parish Council believes that extraction so close to Bray Village would be detrimental to the area and should be rejected. The consultation took place in the autumn but recent additional sites, not in the parish, has resulted in a further consultation. Once again, the Parish Council has employed professional help to prepare our responses.

The autumn also saw consultation from RBWM on modifications to the Borough Local Plan (BLP). The modifications affecting this parish included Tectonic Place reverting back to office space instead of the proposed 25 houses, the 150 houses planned for Monkey Island Lane have been removed from the plan and the gravel works remain. In addition, the land known as HA11 has been split into two and is now known as AL 21 and AL 22. The Triangle Site between the A308M and the A330 Ascot Road is back in the plan for building warehouses. Your Parish Council has responded to these changes. The Parish Council is opposed to development that adds to the traffic on the already congested A roads in the area and is concerned about the proposed development of 4,000 houses on the Syngenta Site at Jealotts Hill. Traffic from this development coupled with that generated by the large number of new houses being built in Bracknell will further add to the traffic problems in the parish.

Bray Parish Council has for some years been concerned about traffic on the A308 and has lobbied for a detailed review of the situation. In early 2019 central government allocated funds to RBWM and others to conduct a study into the whole length of the A308. After some delay we are advised that this study is now under way and we look forward to being actively involved in the review process.

Since this message was written COVID-19 has impacted hugely on the way we live our lives. The Parish Council, like many other businesses has cancelled meetings and closed the parish Office. Our staff are working from home. We are enormously grateful to our band of volunteers who deliver the newsletter for us, but have made the decision that we will only issue this version of the newsletter as an electronic version. This decision has been taken to safeguard our volunteers and staff.

LOOKING AFTER OUR ASSETS – HOLYPORT GREEN

Permission for the Parish Council to install a ditch along the length of the A330 from Bartletts Lane to Holyport Road was finally approved by RBWM on 23rd January 2020.

As part of the approval there are a number of conditions that the Parish Council must satisfy before work can begin. These include; a programme of archaeological work, construction management plan, measures to protect the trees within and along the site and planting of the ditches with wildflower mix. The first three are subject to approval by RBWM. The Parish Council is currently finalising the draft tender document and liaising with the Archaeological Officer in order to comply with the planning conditions.

LIVING IN A CONSERVATION AREA

Within the Parish of Bray many of our Residents are lucky enough to live in one of our three areas designated as "Conservation Areas": Holyport, Bray Village and Riverside. These are 'areas of special architectural or historic interest the character or appearance of which it is desirable to preserve or enhance'. This means that special efforts are made to retain the unique character of these areas and the buildings within them. The unique character may be the result of a number of characteristics, such as an historic street pattern, traditional building styles, one or more listed buildings or possibly an association with an historic event or figure, or a local industry or trade.

The aim of conservation area designation is to protect the wider historic environment. The individual elements are judged against local and regional, rather than national, criteria. Above all, conservation areas should be cohesive areas in which buildings and spaces create unique environments that are irreplaceable. The designation provides extra protection from undesirable development in the following ways:

- Local Authorities have general control over most complete demolition of buildings within conservation areas
- Local Authorities have additional control over some minor development
- Special provision is made to protect trees within conservation areas
- When assessing planning applications, Local Authorities must pay careful attention to the desirability of preserving or enhancing the character and appearance of the conservation area and its setting.

A Conservation Area Appraisal is a report created by Conservation Officers working for the Local Planning Authority, in our case the Royal Borough of Windsor and Maidenhead, which defines the area and its characteristics. The aim of the Appraisal is to:

- Define the conservation area boundaries
- Identify the special architectural or historic interest and the changing needs of the conservation area
- Increase public awareness and involvement in the preservation and enhancement of the area
- Provide a framework for informed planning decisions
- Guide controlled and positive management of change within the conservation area to minimise harm and encourage high quality, contextually responsive design

Local Authorities have a statutory duty to review all their Conservation Areas regularly. English Heritage recommends that each area is reviewed every five years.

In addition to statutory controls and national policy, the Local Authority may include policies in the Borough's Local Plan or Local Development Framework to help preserve the special character and appearance of conservation areas. Bray Parish Council has published a leaflet on this topic, copies of which can be collected from the Parish office or downloaded from the Parish website at www.brayparishcouncil.gov.uk

BUDGET AND PRECEPT 2020/2021

The Parish Council has set a precept of £171,460 for the financial year 2020/2021. The cost to residents has risen by an additional £1.77 to £38.97 for Band D properties.

The budget approved by the Parish Council is for £199,803, with income expected to be £13,130, leaving £15,213 to be met from reserves.

The breakdown of the budget is as follows; Employment costs, including salaries, pensions and national insurance total £67,750. Administration costs, which include rent, telephone, insurance, venue hire, audit fees, legal fees, staff and Councillor training, office supplies, postage, newsletter costs, advertising, election fees, stationery and subscriptions come to £31,900. ICT costs will be £5,900. Land Management fees which include General Maintenance, handyman costs, hedge and tree works and dog waste disposal fees are budgeted at £33,975. Grass cutting will cost £30,575. Facilities Management costs, which include allotments, cemeteries, bus stops, car parks, tennis court, Speed Indicator Device (SID), play areas and bailiff fees are expected to cost £19,720. A grants budget to support local charities and events of £10,000 has been set.

ACCOUNTS 2019/2020

At the time of writing the accounts for the year have not yet been finalised but will be available for inspection on the parish council website in due course in line with the requirements of the Accounts and Audit Regulations 2015.

The major costs for the Council include salary costs, especially Employer pension contributions. Grass cutting which takes place across locations including Holyport Green, Bray Green, Gays Lane Field, Aysgarth Park, Springfield Park and Bray Cemetery. ICT costs, during the financial year the Parish Council moved to a cloud-based system with remote back up. Legal costs which were used for support at the Lodge Farm enquiry. Land maintenance costs included works on Holyport Green, Bray Green and Gays Lane Field. Facilities Management costs included works to Bray allotment fencing, the Parish Chapel roof and pipework along with fees to Bailiffs to evict travellers from Holyport Green.

Under the Terms of the Local Government Act 1972 (S137) the Parish Council may provide grants to charities that support local residents. In 2019/2020 grants were given to;

Bray Enhancement Committee £1,500.
Berkshire Vision £200.
Berkshire Multiple Sclerosis Centre £350.
Braywood Memorial Hall £3,000.
Bray Village Hall £2,188.
Holyport Fair Committee £2,000.
Royal British Legion Poppy Appeal £500.

VEHICLE CRIME

Hello I am PCSO Hogg and I am writing to you today to give you all some advice regarding vehicle crime.

We regularly receive reports of theft from vehicles. One of the best ways to help prevent someone from stealing items from your vehicle is for there to not be anything to steal in the first place- don't leave your phone, cash, jewellery, glasses etc. in your car at all. If possible, park somewhere well-lit and make sure to lock your car. Do not keep lots of stuff in your boot.

Another part of this is the theft of parts of the car itself, especially catalytic converters. These contain platinum which can get thieves a lot of money from scrapping them. As above, park in well-lit areas near entrances or exits to increase the chances of pedestrians seeing potential thefts. Another good practise is parking so that the back of your car cannot be accessed, as this is where the converters are located- i.e. against a wall, parallel parked etc. If you see someone working underneath a car in a strange place such as a car park, they may well be thieves.

License plates have also been stolen for use on cars involved in crime. You can get anti-theft screws cheaply to prevent your license plate being stolen for these purposes.

Related to this is of course the theft of vehicles themselves. If you have a wireless key fob for your car, you should keep your keys far away from the door and in a metal box especially if you have a car with keyless activation.

Keeping your car keys away from the door is a good tactic in general as well. A common tactic used to steal car keys involves an item such as a fishing rod being used to take items through open windows, letterboxes etc., as is reaching through the above in order to take them. In order to prevent this, you should keep your keys at least one meter away from the front door, and ideally out of sight through your windows.

Another great deterrent is a wheel lock, as they make it very difficult for criminals to drive your car after stealing it.

You should also make sure to keep your car ownership details at home instead of inside your car, otherwise they can be used to sell on your car if it is stolen.

Finally, when buying a used car, you should check the mileage and finance are correct, which can be done through multiple websites and services online.

LOOKING AFTER OUR ASSETS – HOLYPORT POND

The Parish Council has sought advice from the Environment Agency regarding Holyport Pond, which is maintained as an area of biodiversity.

The last two very hot summers have seen the levels of the pond fall, causing distress to the fish living in the pond. Although the pond was topped up, it is not beneficial to the wildlife in the pond to have hard water pumped into the pond and so

South East Water will refuse any further requests for topping up.

The major cause of the problem has been the deposit of silt which has been carried into the pond from its various sources along with leaves that have fallen from trees nearby. The Parish Council has now identified most of the places that water enters the pond. RBWM has been asked to ensure the culverts that drain into the pond are kept clear and the gully's across the Green which flow into the pond have been cleared of silt; this gully clearance work will be added to the Annual Asset Maintenance Program of the Parish Council.

The Parish Council has also begun a series of works to reduce the impact of detritus in the pond, which includes the removal of broken tree branches and the crown lifting of the trees that trail across the pond.

Following that work it is hoped to drag the silt from the middle of the pond to the edges as well as to build up the banks of the pond. The Parish Council is currently undertaking regular tests for nitrate and nitrite along with heavy metals levels to check pollutions levels in the pond to ensure that it will be safe for the silt to be used for this work. Finally Rushes around the edge of the pond will be encouraged to grow around the whole of the pond and especially at the area where water accesses the pond, to act as a 'silt trap' to prevent silt settling in the middle of the pond. This work obviously needs to take place outside of the nesting season.

Once this work has been completed, a duck platform will be anchored to the middle of the pond to provide a place of shelter for wildlife.

BRAY CHARITIES

Bray Parish Charities are composed of two charities; Relief in Need (Reg no 237678) and Education (Reg No 309002). They were re-organised as such under a Scheme with seven Trustees set up in 1977. The Trustees automatically include whoever is the Vicar, three Trustees nominated by the Parish Council and three more who are co-opted. The area of benefit to which the charities apply is the Ancient Ecclesiastical Parish of Bray, thus including some areas now absorbed into adjoining parishes (for example Cox Green).

Trustees hold meetings at least twice a year and can now deal with requests made to them at other times too. Individual applicants may be assisted by either charity. Grants from Education may be made to schools so that a number of children

may benefit (for example from books or equipment).

Funds are invested with the Charity Commission and derive from money or land donated by individuals or specific bodies from as far back as the early part of the seventeenth century. None is later than the 1822. There are only limited sums of money for distribution.

A GUIDE TO THE HOLYPORT VILLAGE SHOW

The Holyport Village Show (HVS) is celebrating its 25th anniversary this year. It is held annually on the second Saturday in September in the Holyport War Memorial Hall. This year that date is Saturday, 12th September.

We are a traditional show that brings the local community together in a semi-competitive environment! At the beginning of the year, the HVS committee meets to produce the Show Schedule. This is an A5 yellow booklet which can be picked up for free from a number of local outlets from mid-April onwards. In there you will find 9 groups of classes that people within, or have a connection with, Bray Parish may enter.

Group 1 is 'Vegetables'. Last year we had a number of pumpkins displayed outside the Village Hall. Weather permitting, we are hopeful of doing the same this year and they will be accompanied by marrows.

Group 2 is 'Fruit'. This includes tomatoes. Great fun to choose the best 10 cherry tomatoes to display when a couple of plants can produce so many!

Group 3 is 'Flowers and Plants'. We have introduced for this year gladiolus and a sunflower head. We also run a tallest sunflower competition; the details of which can be found on page 7 of the show schedule.

Group 4 is 'Flower Arranging'. It amazes me the time and effort that goes in to prepare these exhibits.

Group 5 is 'Preserves'. Under this heading we also have fruit liqueur and home brew beer. If anybody brews beer then please enter a bottle. It can be any type of beer and I'm sure the judge will give you some constructive feedback!

Group 6 is 'Cookery' and probably the most competitive. Last year we introduced chocolate brownies and they were so popular that we are doing it again this year; along with a welcome return of flapjacks.

Group 7A is 'Crafts'. This year's artwork is themed around the Olympics. Group 7B is 'Photography'. Everyone can take a photo, especially with the advent of the smartphone! We have 4 categories each year; one is always a colour. This year it is 'Silver' because of our 25th anniversary! The other 3 categories are 'Creepy Crawlies', 'A Place of Worship' and 'Dramatic Skies'. I always tell entrants to think 'a bit outside the box' when it comes to photography!

Group 8 are the 'Junior Classes'. These are incredibly popular and I love seeing the effort that has been made, particularly the time taken to come up with a unique Lego model. We are theming the Junior Classes for the first time this year to make it easier for parents to decide with their children what they should paint etc. The theme is 'Olympics'. BRAY PARISH NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

Councillors agreed at the Council meeting on 8th October 2018 to withdraw the Bray Parish Neighbourhood Plan for further consideration as they felt that the amendments required for the plan to be approved for referendum did not take into consideration the wishes of the residents.

The Parish Council was recently advised that as the Fisheries are now a Ward of Bray Parish Council additional work would be needed to include the views of residents in our new ward in the Parish Neighbourhood Plan as well as to bring the plan up to date. The Parish Council has therefore sought advice to find out what will be required to bring the plan up to date. We hope that a Working Party of Councillors and residents working with a mentor will help the Parish Council to achieve a plan that reflects the wishes of the residents as well as being compliant and which the Parish Council can present to residents for approval by referendum in due course.

FOREST BRIDGE SCHOOL

Forest Bridge School is a Special Free School for children age 4-16 with a diagnosis of Autism.

The Founders are: Jo Haswell, Jane Balmer, Tracy Holliday, Simon Dudley, Isabel Marsala and Asiye Suleyman who all live in RBWM. The parent founders, Jo, Jane, Tracy, Isabel and Asiye met through Berkshire autistic society and all have children with autism. Approval for the school was given in October 2014 following the application to the Dept for Education in May 2014. Forest Bridge School opened in the old Oldfield School premises in Sept 2015 - this was a temporary site while a site for the new purpose-built school was found. If all goes to plan, Forest Bridge School will move into their new premises on Braywick in November 2020.

At Forest Bridge School we encourage confidence, creativity and even a short amount of time outside, as this has countless physical and emotional benefits. Being able to try new things are important skills that can build children's resilience and self-esteem, there will be a sensory garden, mud kitchen and an allotment area in the central courtyard.

The Rt Hon Theresa May MP visited the new site recently and was presented with a brick by James Haswell one of the founding pupils. During the visit, the Founders and Mrs May were given a presentation about the new site by the Kier site team.

Friends of Forest Bridge School is a registered charity and was set up by the Founders in 2014 to support Forest Bridge School. Various fundraising activities are organised and have already provided many resources for the school including; bikes and scooters, sensory equipment, skills wall, outdoor table tennis table, a stage. The current fundraising is to provide an outdoor gym, sensory garden and outdoor play equipment. The 'Buy a Brick' campaign will raise funds towards these projects. The inscribed bricks will be displayed on a specially designed wall in the main school entrance. BRAYWICK COURT SCHOOL

Braywick Court School opened in 2014 as a one form entry primary school serving its local community of Bray and surrounding areas. In 2017 they were proud to receive a grading by Ofsted of outstanding in all areas. The school opened with a reception class only and will have one class in each year group, Reception to Year 6, by September 2020.

Braywick Court School spent more than five years on temporary sites during an extensive building project. In November 2019 the school moved back into a brand-new purpose-built building. This includes a hall with conferencing facilities and an outdoor learning area for each class, including a terrace on the first floor. The school is tucked in the corner of the Nature Reserve on Hibbert Road.

Braywick Court School is run by Bellevue Place Education Trust, who value blending the best of the state and the independent sector to develop children who are "interested and interesting."

Braywick Court School and Bray Pre School have recently started to work together to support an offer of high-quality education for children in Bray aged 2 to 11 years.

Braywick Court values the local community of Bray and is working to become an integral part of village life. The school already hosts many events and community groups. Villagers are warmly welcomed to their Summer Festival on Saturday 27th June 12-3pm.
